As I write this we are approaching the end of 2023 and beginning a new year. As I often do around this season, I find myself think about New Year's resolutions and what I'd like to do differently in the new year.

Recently I heard a friend make some statements that I found disturbing. It was something that sat in the pit of my stomach like food that had turned, leaving me feeling queasy and uneasy. It even ate at my sense of our friendship.

About a week later I talked with a mutual friend about my discomfort. She provided some context to the statement that I did not know which changed my understanding of what was originally said. I am extremely grateful for that conversation because it reminded me that I don't always know what is behind statements that people make.

2024 will likely be challenging. There are wars, with all of the suffering, loss, and grief. The economy feels shaky. The effects of climate change are more evident. And it will be an election year, again (or still) loaded with fears and threats to our democracy. All of this takes root within us, affecting how we interact and interpret things.

In the midst of that, we often live with assumptions that we know what is going on with someone else, why they believe what they do, why they make certain statements. I am hoping to remember my experience with my friend and how I don't always have the whole picture. I'm not sure I would label that a *New Year's resolution*, but it is certainly something I will try to remember in my various relationships and interactions.

I wonder, what are you thinking about? What experiences have you had recently that opens you to seeing things a little bit differently or changes how you relate with others?

- 1. <u>Karen Georgia Thompson becomes first woman to lead UCC in historic vote</u>. This story unfolded over much of this year, from the announcement of Thompson's recommendation by the UCC Board's search committee as the next General Minister and President in February, to the historic vote at General Synod in July, all the way to her service of installation and celebration in October.
- 2. <u>General Synod 34 elects new leadership, changes frequency, witnesses justice</u>. Groundbreaking news came from this year's national gathering of the United Church of Christ, which took place in Indianapolis in July.
- 3. <u>'Just peace, human dignity': UCC joins calls for ceasefire, prayer vigil for Israel and Palestine</u>. As hostilities and violence in Israel and Palestine escalated in October and have continued, the UCC has joined partners in calls for ceasefire and moral response, and issued an appeal for humanitarian aid and action alerts.
- 4. <u>Churches in Ohio, California attacked for sponsoring drag shows</u>. In a year where a growing number of UCC churches experienced attacks and vandalism for their stances on LGBTQ+ inclusivity and racial justice, churches, pastors and other leaders responded with messages that "Love Is Louder" than hate and a great celebration of extravagant welcome, including glitter blessings and acts of justice and liberation during Pride month.
- 5. <u>Amid wildfires devastation, UCC makes appeal for Hawaii</u>. UCC congregations and members across the country joined together to support those impacted by disasters.

While children and youth can't vote in elections, their well-being must be integral to how people of faith vote their values on Election Day. The decisions made by our elected officials will have an enormous impact on their lives and their future.

#### Historian's Corner

The following is a sermon given by Reverend Loken for Christmas of 1950

"I am the light of the world, he that followeth me shall not walk in darkness but have the light of life."

Why all of this fuss about Christmas, the birthday of Jesus? Some folks ask? We make no such efforts to commemorate other benefactors of the race. We accept gratefully the thoughts of Plato, the insights of Copernicus and we make grateful use of the inventions of Edison. But we feel under no special obligation to remember the incidents of his life or birth/ Why this special concern about the birth and life of Jesus? The answer is simple. These benefactors all point to some light of truth beyond themselves. One may rethink the thoughts of Plate without ever having heard of Plato himself, and a person may reconstruct the Copernican system of astronomy without reference to Copernicus. The truth is there, independent of the man who first pointed it out.

With Jesus, it is quite different. "I am the truth, I am the light of the world he said. It was not only that he pointed to the truth that he spoke the truth, he was the truth.

It is this fact which sets him apart from all other prophets and teachers. Other teachers have approximated many of his thoughts and sayings in the moral realm. It is true that none of them has given us such high moral precepts; but that is not the most important contribution of Jesus. The point that makes his teaching unique and authoritative is the fact that he was the embodiment of it. When he said, "blessed are the poor in spirit", it seems at first sight an impossible paradox, until we gaze at this life and realize that here is a person who lives it, who is it, humble, unpretentious, yet gloriously happy. It is the colossal authority of his life and character that lends authority to his ethical teachings. When he told John the Baptist "see what I am doing, the lame walk, the blind see, and the poor have the gospel preached to them" He was telling John the obvious fact that here was a life victorious over sin and disease, life incarnate.

When he told his disciples at the last parting: "In my father's house are many rooms, I go to prepare one for you" He was not merely discouraging on immortality, not merely theorizing of its possibility; not merely uttering a hope. He was stating a fact he was prepared to demonstrate out of his own experience. He was the pioneer of our faith, who had covered the way before. He is the way. This is the uniqueness of Jesus. He is not only the founder of our religion, He is our religion! Christ is Christianity.

The difference between him and other benefactors is the difference between moonlight and sunlight, between the warmth of the sun and the cold glitter of the stars. One is a source of light, the other is but a reflected light.

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In my third reader at school, there was story of a little girl who was asked what light she would extinguish, if she had the power, that of the sun or the moon? Without hesitation, she said the sun. For in the daytime, it's light enough anyhow. That girl had never learned to recognize that daylight depends for its existence on the sun except for an occasional eclipse, it shines so steadily that we are unaware of its presence, we take if tor granted in our waking hours. Whereas the moon comes and goes and we are keenly aware of its absence. Even so is the case of Jesus Christ. His influence in the world has become so universal, the warmth of his spirit has so penetrated our world that we are not aware of it, we take it for granted, like the air we breathe. Only when men began to remove that influence in an organized effort and to substitute concentration camps and the Jewish murders, only as we see it exhibited in the pagan work camps, do we begin to realize what the whole meaning of Christ is the significance of Christmas. That this life was no mere myth, that this religion is no mere system of doctrines someone has invented, is the crucial difference between our religion and every other. It is a religion with a Christmas, with an historic person at its center.
