Council News

I was amazed and overjoyed at the amount of enthusiasm generated by the Mission Statement sessions. So many ideas came out of the sessions that it was hard to keep track. A committee has been organized (Eileen O'Grady, Marilyn Hamilton, and John Lawrence) to incorporate these fabulous ideas into a mission statement. They were so inspired they developed something very quickly. Pastor Heather has been sharing this with you over the course of 3 Sundays then plans for a conversation following worship on September 10th to finalize our new mission statement.

In the August meeting, the council approved two projects to be coordinated by Eagle Scouts, Keith Kania. Keith will be rebuilding the entrance to the basement of the fellowship hall. Izak will be tearing up the old, unwanted plants in the triangle area within the brick/cinderblock area between the Sanctuary and Fellowship Hall. Both projects are awaiting District approval from Eagle Scouts.

Also in the August meeting, the council voted to accept two lease contracts, one for Acorn Village Montessori and the other for Oakwood Enrichment Academy. Both programs will be under the direction of Kristina Prozesky.

The September Council Meeting is set for Sunday, September 17th at noon and the October meeting is set for October 15th at noon. Anyone can join us for our meetings. The Committees are: Personnel, Budget, Nominating, Finance, and an Ad Hoc Committee to review and possibly revise our By-Laws.

Bring on the Cereal!

ALF Food Pantry (which you may still think of as Atascadero Loaves and Fishes, aka ALF) is facing financial concerns as both client numbers and food costs have increased in the past two years. YOU can help...

ALF Food Pantry's aim is to provide nutritious food to residents of Atascadero, Templeton, Santa Margarita, Creston or the California Valley. One of the items that the food pantry provides to families each week is cereal. Much of the food provided by the pantry comes at very low cost from the SLO Food Bank, or through gleaning. Cereal, however, is purchased at one of our local grocery stores, making it one of the most expensive items provided.

ALF Food Pantry is inviting local churches to help offset the cost of cereal by making cereal donations throughout the year. Schools will be invited to contribute too.

OCTOBER is our month to make a difference for families with inadequate resouces for food. During the month of October you can bring cold cereal (in boxes or bags suitable for families) of any type. Or, you could bring instant or quick oatmeal, again in sizes no larger than a family could use in a couple of weeks.

Other ways to help ALF Food Pantry include making a financial donation or becoming a volunteer working a few hours a week in one of many jobs. As the month progresses, you'll hear more about ALF Food Pantry and what we do from a couple of Community Church members who are volunteers. Neighbors in Need

Neighbors in Need is the UCC's annual offering to support ministries of justice and compassion through-out the United States, including the Council for American Indian Ministries (CAIM), justice and advocacy efforts, and direct service projects funded by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries.

The Neighbors in Need offering, which we will receive on **October 1**, supports the UCC's ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. Two-thirds of the offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries to fund a wide array of local and national justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects. Through our national Justice and Local Church Ministries office, https://tinyurl.com/2bfytatb, you can find resources, news updates, and action alerts on a broad spectrum of justice issues. Working with members of the UCC Justice and Peace Action Network (a network of thousands of UCC justice and peace advocates), Justice and Witness continues its strong policy advocacy work on issues such as the federal budget, voting rights, immigration, health care, hate crimes, civil liberties, and environmental justice. Neighbors in Need also supports our American Indian neighbors in the UCC. One-third of the offering supports the UCC's Council for American Indian Ministries (CAIM). Historically, forebears of the UCC established churches and worked with Lakota, Dakota, Nakota, Mandan, Hidatsa, Arickara, and Hocak in North and South Dakota, Wisconsin, and northern Nebraska. Today there are 20 UCC congregations on reservations and one urban, multi-tribal UCC congregation in Minneapolis, Minnesota. These churches and their pastors are supported by CAIM. CAIM is also an invaluable resource for more than 1,000 individuals from dozens of other tribes and nations who are members of other UCC congregations in the U.S.

Historians Corner

PREFACE TO HISTORY OF THE FEDERATED CHURCH MANSE FOR COMMUNITY CHURCH OF ATASCADERO

The Manse was built as a private home for Charles Lindsey in 1917 (16). In 1919 it was purchased by the Federated Church as the parsonage. The Federated Church was composed of more than twenty denominations who met together. At this time they met in the Pine Mountain Stadium Park, in a theatre building which was located at the end of Bajada Ave. on Traffic Way, and other places. H.J. Loken was the first minister to occupy the Manse. The Manse was home to all of the church's ministers with the exception of one, who moved, after they bought a home in Templeton. At that time, the house was used as a residence for the caretakers of the Church grounds.

In 1921, the Community Center (Present day Atascadero Bible Church) was built and became the hub for all sorts of activities as well as the home of the Federated Church.

In later years, The Federated Church fell on hard times when the mortgage payments couldn't be met, possibly due in part to it's dwindling membership. By this time some denominations had found other homes. Mrs. Ewalt paid off the mortgage and the Church of the Living Word was formed, the beginning of the present ABC Church.

Another group made plans to build on the present site of the Community Church of Atascadero. The land for Fellowship Hall was given by Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Hess and the land for the Parking Lot was given by Mr. and Mrs. J.F. Marshall. Many fundraisers were held and when the church (now the Fellowship Hall) was built, it was debt free.

Most of this information is from "A HISTORY OF THE FEDERATED CHURCH & THE FIRST COMMUNITY CHURCH OF ATASCADERO CALIFORNIA" by Frances (Fullinwider) Fenny, 1968. She said "noted at this time was the fact that while the Manse had been purchased and planned as just that, during these last years of the Federated Church and the beginning of the Community Church, it was used more as a Parish House, for there was a continuous procession of meetings and conferences held there."

Donna Shinoda graciously digitized this account for the Centennial of the church.
